

# UPDATE ON THE PROPOSED THUNDERBOLT WIND FARM PROJECT

Thunderbolt Wind Farm, proposed by NEOEN Energy, would straddle the boundary between Tamworth and Uralla Shire. Like most large-scale renewable developments in the New England Renewable Energy Zone, the proposal constitutes State Significant Development, to be assessed by the NSW Government.

The proposal has been referred to the Independent Planning Commission for assessment. The Assessment Report prepared by the NSW Government and their recommended conditions of consent can be found on the Independent Planning Commission website.

To ensure our community receives legacy outcomes from this development, Tamworth and Uralla Shire Councils have been negotiating with NEOEN on community benefit payments. Payments would be valued at 1.5% of total capital investment value (\$160,000 per year), and then adjusted for inflation annually over the expected 30-year life of the project.

Initially, it was proposed that these payments would be shared 50/50 between Tamworth and Uralla Shire Councils, based on an understanding that similar impacts would be experienced by communities in both local government areas. However, given only 2 – 3 of the total 32 wind turbines will now be located in our shire, it is proposed that contributions to Uralla Shire would equal 40% of the overall funding pool, payable to us in annual instalments.

Uralla Shire Council has proposed our payments are made into a newly established Renewable Energy Community Benefit Restricted Fund. The restricted funds will be administered by Uralla Shire Council but remain separated from other council finances. Funds could only be released for projects that benefit our community in consultation with our community.

To facilitate this, a community advisory body will be established to advise Council on projects seeking investment from within the fund. Further consideration will be given to this advisory body, including Terms of Reference, at a future Council meeting.

You may have noticed fences are down around Pioneer Park, as we near the completion of Stage 1 of the installation of our Fibonacci design.

Did you know Uralla is the only town in Australia whose postcode – 2358 – follows the Fibonacci sequence?

Named after a 13th Century Italian mathematician, a Fibonacci sequence of numbers is created when each number is the sum of the two numbers before it, for example 1+1=2, 1+2=3, 2+3=5, 3+5=8.

Over coming weeks, the four brick pillars standing on the corner of Bridge and Salisbury Streets will start to be covered in colourful mosaic tile artwork.

Council is continuing to seek funding for Stage 2 of the design, which will bring mosaic art to the pathway wall and the tiered seating features.

Late last year, Council received a \$3.9 million grant from the NSW Government through the Restart NSW program to help improve road safety between Uralla and Inverell along Thunderbolts Way.

Throughout April, Council's road team will be focused on a 3.8km stretch of road approximately 11km north of Uralla.

In recent weeks, the team have upgraded this section with added pavement material and stabilised the base course to both widen and strengthen the road, resulting in an overall safer surface that will last longer and reduce ongoing maintenance costs.

Weather permitting, the crew will soon begin sealing this section, and at the end of April will continue their work further north of Uralla, commencing another 1.6km of road that will complete the Scrubby Gully component of this major undertaking for Council.

Residents are reminded to clear the way for water meter readers, with readings taking place across Uralla and Bundarra throughout May. Water bills will then be sent out in June.

You can assist by ensuring clear access to your water meter so readers can record water use and repair or replace your water meter if required.

We may not be able to read your meter if:

- It is behind a locked gate
- It is unsafe to enter the property
- An aggressive dog is present
- It is buried in concrete or dirt
- It is inaccessible due to overgrown grass, garden or vegetation



On Saturday, 14 September 2024 the NSW Electoral Commission will conduct local government elections across all councils in NSW. Voters in every local government area will elect councillors to their local council. It is compulsory to vote in an election if you are eligible to do so.

Uralla Shire is divided into two electoral wards, Ward A and Ward B. Voters will elect eight councillors in total – four to each of our electoral wards on a four-year term.

Additionally, Uralla Shire Council holds a mayoral election, and on this occasion, will also hold a constitutional referendum.

#### **MAYORAL ELECTION**

In Uralla Shire, a mayor who is in addition to the eight elected councillors, also serving a four-year term, is directly elected by voters. In 2024, our referendum will ask voters if they would like this process to change in future.

#### **CONSTITUTIONAL REFERENDUM**

At a meeting held on 7 February 2024, Councillors resolved to hold a constitutional referendum at the upcoming election, seeking voter direction on the following two questions through a yes or no response:

## 1. Are you in favour of the Mayor being elected by the Councillors?

If supported, this would mean that in future, voters would no longer directly elect their mayor. Instead, a mayor would be selected from within the nine elected councillors. If supported, the change would come into effect at the next local government election, scheduled for 2028. It does not change the 2024 election process.

2. Are you in favour of removing the current ward system so that all electors vote for all Councillors that represent the Uralla Shire Council area?

If supported, this would abolish our current system of wards from 2028, and voters would instead elect councillors in an undivided council area. The change, would also come into effect at the next local government election scheduled for 2028. It does not change the 2024 election process.

We will be providing further information regarding the 2024 local government election and our constitutional referendum closer to the September election.
